ECIAAA Annual Report for Fiscal Years 2019-2020 Letter from the Chairperson of the Corporate Board



Dear Friends,

Looking back on my first year as Chairperson for the ECIAAA Corporate Board, I would have never foresaw a year completely consumed by the COVID-19 pandemic. The pandemic has affected every individual in the United States in some manner. However, our senior population has seen unproportioned COVID-related adversity this past year. ECIAAA staff has turned in a herculean effort to stem the tide of adversity by supporting those who directly support our older adults in east central Illinois. Since mid-March, each day has brought a never-ending barrage of challenges along with new opportunities. The staff of ECIAAA has met the challenges and addressed the opportunities with adaptive and timely changes. Below are just a few of the many adaptive changes made by ECIAAA staff to provide continuous support to our older adults.

COVID-19 restrictions challenged the traditional service delivery system of nutrition services, benefit assistance programs, caregiver support services - the list goes on. However, we turned those challenges into opportunities by developing non-traditional delivery methods. ECIAAA administered over \$2.1M in emergency funding through the Families First Coronavirus Response Act (FFCRA) & Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security (CARES) Act to our network of 21 service providers. ECIAAA, in partnership with the Illinois Aging Network, facilitated the delivery of 45,600 Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) provided shelf-stable meals and Personal Protective Equipment (PPE). The delivery of congregate nutrition services had to be modified to a carry-out format, home delivered meal volunteers kept up the deliveries so current participants wouldn't miss a meal, while adding 1,500 new participants. ECIAAA collaborated with the United Way of Illinois and the Alliance of Illinois Community Foundations to provide over \$62,000 in gap-filling services to older adults, individuals with disabilities, and grandparents raising grandchildren. ECIAAA is helping socially isolated adults obtain technology devices such as iPads and tablets through the Illinois Care Connections program in partnership with the Illinois Assistive Technology Program (IATP). Finally, ECIAAA continued to support local service providers in promoting the 2020 CENSUS, which is so important in ensuring east central Illinois receives its fair share of federal funding for older adults.

To meet its mandate as essential workers, ECIAAA transitioned staff to working remotely while the Executive Director, Deputy Director, Planning & Grants Manager, and Executive Services are continuing to work from the office. I am certain that the ECIAAA staff are more than prepared to continue adapting the agency's policies, funding, and provider support in response to any new opportunities the pandemic might throw our way. I would also like to thank the members of the ECIAAA Corporate Board for their continued engagement and support throughout the past year. Please be safe and stay well.


