Busy mom of eight explains how it's done

Guiding eight children through the ins and outs of growing up was a cinch for Doris Doedtman and her late husband Norbert. "I always said it wasn't no more trouble with eight than you have with two. They knew what they could do and what they couldn't," Doris said. "I lived by the old rule – spanking."

Doris said she never worked outside the home because she was busy raising their family, growing a vegetable garden and preserving the food. "I canned between 1,000 and 1,500 jars a year."

When it came to sitting at the dinner table, one of her daughters, Dolores, had the privilege of sitting right beside mom at meal time. "She didn't want to eat, so I had to make her eat. Another time, she was going to help me weed the corn (in the garden) but she was picking the corn and leaving the weeds."

Doris believes she has the unique title of being the only one around our area to have been born at Funkhouser, II., in an original log cabin. "Grandpa bought the log cabin from someone and they moved it in." However, she doesn't remember living there because the family moved away when Doris was around 3 and later moved again.

Explaining how she met her future husband, Doris said when she was a young woman her dad bought a place for the family to live and a young man named Norbert had been seeing the girl who

had lived there. Then this new girl moved in and he began asking questions about her and said he thought Doris was pretty. Around this time, the Korean War was going on and Doris had a hobby she enjoyed - writing to Norbert and several other soldiers as pen pals. But Norbert was special.

"He wrote and asked me if he could send me a ring. I don't think he ever did just ask me to marry him, but we got married in Dieterich in the Catholic Church parsonage."

Doris' husband made a career of being in the National Guard and had joined it in 1953. He was employed by a furniture store in Dieterich as a carpet layer and also laid carpet as a sideline. But working two jobs was a bit much. "We went into business for ourselves in 1968 and I was the first lady carpet layer in Effingham County," Doris said.

The couple also volunteered their help at the American Legion. "Norb and I got the first award that was ever given for volunteer service from the American Legion in Effingham County." She said they took food to VA clinics and Doris also worked at Catholic Charities for several years until they moved their store. "Anytime anybody wanted something, they put Norb and me in."

Today she still volunteers to help at the Life Center's bake sales and breakfasts and soup suppers as well as helping with Peace Meal needs, such as wrapping silverware or anything the kitchen could use help with. She also enjoys playing Skip-Bo or Aggravation as well as other games with seniors who visit the Life Center.
